

Chapter #9: Is Governor Dunleavy's Inner Circle Corrupt?

In late 2024, five citizens asked Governor Michael Dunleavy for a meeting, to present evidence requiring him to appoint an independent "Mollen" type commission to publicly investigate.

Two of the five citizens were Borough Mayors Edna DeVries and Peter Micciche.

Evidence given in advance to justify the meeting: (1) implicated the Alaska Commission on Judicial Conduct's only judge investigator (Marla Greenstein) in falsifying investigations to keep corrupt judges on the bench; (2) implicated Ms. Greenstein in falsifying certified documents; (3) included tape recordings proving the Department of Law (particularly Deputy AG John Skidmore) is actively stopping Grand Jury investigations into Ms. Greenstein; and (4) included tape recordings proving Mr. Skidmore lied to legislators Mike Chenault and Peter Micciche when they investigated the forgoing allegations of judicial misconduct.

But instead of Governor Dunleavy meeting with the group, Janice Mason (Governor's Director of Scheduling) emailed: *"It has been asked that you meet directly with John Skidmore, Department of Law.* [See attached email thread.] (Who is "It"?)

The group protested that their evidence criminally implicated Deputy AG Skidmore. Ms. Mason then requested they meet with Deputy AG Cori Mills.

The AG's office then aggressively tried to force the group to forgo presenting corruption evidence. They even threatened to cancel the meeting if the group continued to discuss corruption allegations – despite the fact the Governor's office had already confirmed that this was the subject of the meeting. [See email thread]

During the meeting, Ms. Mills refused to allow admission of corruption evidence – and refused to discuss it when brought up, making for an incredibly bizarre meeting. [See video]

When pressed, Ms. Mills stated that neither she nor the Attorney General had authority to investigate. (If they don't, who does?) [See video]

Because Ms. Mills refused presentation of corruption evidence, as granted by the Governor's office, the group renewed their request to meet with the Governor - stating the bizarre meeting was by itself reason to require such a commission. [See renewed Governor meeting request.]

The group expressed concern that the Governor was being kept in the dark and requested confirmation he was aware of this concern. [See renewed Governor meeting request.] Ms. Mason refused to provide confirmation – leaving the group believing that she (Ms. Mason), AAG Mills, and Ninia Dizon (Deputy AG Skidmore's secretary) are intentionally keeping Governor Dunleavy in the dark.

Conclusion

There is a simple way to figure out if Governor Dunleavy's inner circle kept him in the dark, or if Governor Dunleavy ordered them to obstruct the group. It's called an independent "Mollen" type commission (or Grand Jury – after We-The-People smash the chains binding it) that will subpoena Governor Dunleavy, Ms. Mason, Ms. Mills, and Ms. Dizon to testify about why the Governor never met with the group. A group that included two sitting Borough Mayors and wished to present hard evidence of systemic judicial and executive branch corruption, conspiracy, and cover up.

Without a doubt, it will be absolutely riveting when these officials are forced to testify. Watergate doesn't hold a candle to what Alaska can brew.

Maybe it's over-the-top to mention that age old adage: he (or she) who squeals first gets the best deal.

New York City's 1994 Mollen Commission (appointed by Mayor Dinkins to publicly investigate): *"To cover up their corruption, officers created even more: they falsified official reports and perjured themselves to conceal their misdeeds. In the face of this problem, the Department allowed its systems for fighting corruption virtually to collapse. It had become more concerned about the bad publicity that corruption disclosures generate than the devastating consequences of corruption itself. As a result, its corruption controls minimized, ignored and at times concealed corruption rather than rooting it out. Such an institutional reluctance to uncover corruption is not surprising. No institution wants its reputation tainted – especially a Department that needs the public's confidence and partnership to be effective. Since no entity outside the Department was responsible for reviewing the Department's success in policing itself, years of self-protection continued unabated until this Commission commenced its independent inquiries."*

A growing number of good, strong, and true Alaskans are determined to fix Alaska's corruption.

Our first action will be a peaceful sit-in at noon on December 11, 2026 (just after new Governor takes office) in Anchorage's Atwood Building (Governor's office), until the new Governor appoints an independent "Mollen" type commission to publicly investigate this.
